

The Overall Trail

Franklin & RRFN portions



Length: approx. 36 miles

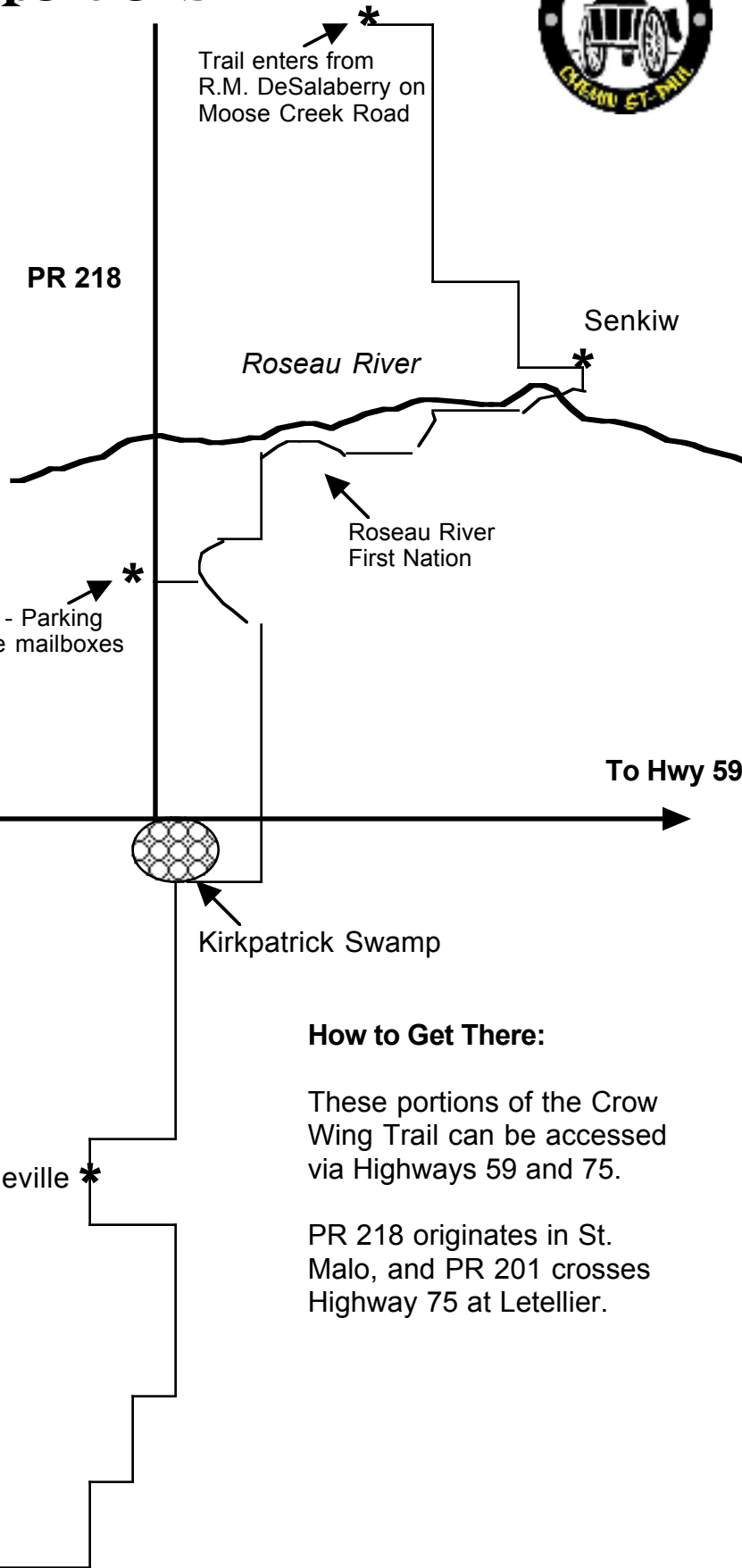
Description: The trail uses a combination of gravel and dirt roads along with undeveloped road allowance for the majority of the trail.

It enters both private land and First Nation reserve land in addition to road allowance.

The Crow Wing Trail is the longest part of the Trans-Canada Trail in Manitoba, and the Franklin portion is the longest part of the Crow Wing Trail.

Topography: The trail includes woods with oaks and poplars. It passes through intact riparian belts where rare plant species are still found. It passes a wetland one mile in diameter, and moves across open prairie.

The trail passes by farmland used for grain and oilseed crops, as well as pasture for horses, cattle and sheep. There is abundant birdlife, along with deer, fox, coyote, and the occasional bear.



How to Get There:

These portions of the Crow Wing Trail can be accessed via Highways 59 and 75.

PR 218 originates in St. Malo, and PR 201 crosses Highway 75 at Letellier.
